Alongside the summer packet we are providing, here are a few more suggestions for getting ready for kindergarten!


- \*Practice tying shoes, buttoning pants, and putting on jackets.
- \*Practice using the bathroom and washing hands independently.
- \*Practice what to say when they aren't feeling well. (Sometimes our students aren't sure how to tell us they aren't feeling well. Encourage them to share with us if their belly feels gross or their head or throats hurt. Usually we can tell, but having them communicate any ailment always helps us to help them feel better quicker!
- \*Practice blowing their nose. This isn't usually something that is troubling in the Fall, but more so as the winter months approach.

### IO WAYS TO PREPARE YOUR CHILD FOR KINDERGARTEN

- 1. Read to them every day.
- 2. Work on fine motor skills with playdoh, Legos, sand, etc.

# A Note to Families


Summer break is a wonderful time for students, however there is always a certain amount of regression that occurs over extended breaks from school.

In this packet you will find:


- \*Two calendars with suggested literacy and math activities




#### Tips


- \*If your student does not already know the sight words, start out with 10 of them and add another 10 each week, until all 50 words are part of the sight word practice time.
- \*If your child has already mastered this set of 50 words, search the internet for a list of Frye words. The Frye list is where the attached sight words came from.
- \*Some additional skills, not included in this packet, but would benefit students is work with color words and number words.
- \*As far as organizing materials, put each set of number tiles and letter tiles in their own plastic bag. (For example: Put all of the upper case letters in one bag. Put all of the lower case letters in another bag. And so on...)
- \*Doing a little something each day is a great way to maintain all of the gains your child accomplished this past school year.






